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## **BCCC** opens its doors Oct. 2

Beaufort County Community College is opening its doors and inviting members of the community throughout its service area to visit and learn about opportunities available to them.

The college will hold an Open House, 6 to 9 p.m., Thursday, Oct. 2, with the theme "You Fit Here! Come Take a Look!" giving attendees the chance to meet with faculty, staff and current students; tour the campus; view classes in progress; learn about various programs leading to a degree, diploma or certificate; learn about personal enrichment and skill development classes and much more. Refreshments will be available at locations across the campus during the Open House.

Those who attend will also have a chance to win a \$1,500 scholarship that can be used at BCCC for tuition, registration fees, books, uniforms, tools of the trade and testing fees.

"Beaufort County Community College has been a part of eastern North Carolina for almost 50 years, but many people may not know how they fit into the BCCC community," said Jay Sullivan, BCCC vice president of Research and Institutional Effectiveness and event chairman. "The purpose of the Open House is to introduce these people to our campus.

"Whether folks are making plans for college, wanting to upgrade their job skills or looking for a new hobby or interest, we believe they will fit in at BCCC," said Sullivan.

Sullivan noted several specific activities that may be of interest to attendees, including a demonstration and hands-on training on BCCC's new virtual welder, a tour of the updated Firearms Qualification Range, the opportunity to climb inside a BCCC 18-wheel truck and a visit to the Basic Law

Oct. 14, as part of a photography project that will be held for the second year in a row, *One Day at BCCC.* 


The BCCC community is being asked to take a photograph of something happening on campus which they find interesting and send the photograph along with a caption describing the activity

# BCCC announces spring registration schedule

Beaufort County Community College announces its registration schedule for Spring Semester which is scheduled to begin Wednesday, Jan. 7, 2015.

The dates for enrolling and registering are as follows:

- Monday, Oct. 27 Registration for graduating students, 8 A.M. to 5 P.M.
- Tuesday, Oct. 28 New Student Orientation.
- Tuesday, Oct. 28 Registration for new students who have attended New Student Orientation and returning students, 8 A.M. to 6 P.M.
- Wednesday, Oct. 29 Friday, Nov. 7 Registration continues Monday through Thursday, 8 A.M. to 5 P.M.; Friday, 8 A.M. to 4 P.M.
- Thursday, Nov. 13 Tuition bills for Spring Semester mailed to those who have registered.
- Friday, Dec. 12 Deadline to pay for Spring Semester tuition, 4 P.M.
- Tuesday, Jan. 6 Late registration, 8 A.M. to 6 P.M.
- Wednesday, Jan. 7 First day of classes.

Spring 2015 tuition and fees have been approved by the N.C. Board of Community Colleges. Tuition for in-state students is \$72 per credit hour and student fees at \$4 per credit hour for a total of \$76 per credit hour. Tuition for out-of-state students is \$264 per credit hour and student fees at \$4 per credit hour for a total of \$268.

# BCCC participates in "1,000 in 100" initiative

Beaufort County Community College is participating in a statewide effort to understand the challenges and successes business and industry faces in finding and retaining high-quality employees.

BCCC is part of a team of workforce development partners that is leading the effort in Beaufort County.

The local effort is being led by Lauren Dudley, BCCC's Customized Training director and Walter Dorsey, director of the Region Q Workforce Development Board, who serve as co-chairmen of the project.

This month, the team began visiting local businesses as part of Gov. Pat McCrory's "1,000 in 100" initiative announced last spring as part of NCWorks.

"1,000 in 100" refers to the governor's call to have local teams visit 1,000 businesses of all types in all 100 counties in the last 100 days of 2014.

The team includes representatives from BCCC, NCWorks, Washington/Beaufort Chamber of Commerce, Mid-East Commission, and Region Q Workforce Development. The team has been meeting since early August and has chosen the companies for each visit as well as the teams to conduct the visits.

"This is a great opportunity for Beaufort County to build on our past partnerships, get face-to-face with businesses, hear concerns, develop solutions and lay the foundation for how we work together in the future," Dudley said.

Dorsey agreed.

"We want to listen together so we can bring solutions and services together," he said. "The end goal is to help both employers and employees."

The "1,000 in 100" initiative will conclude at the end of 2014, but the infor-

mation gathered will be paired with other research and best practices to develop recommendations for changes within North Carolina's workforce system to better serve businesses and citizens, according to McCrory.

"If we want to know what is working and what isn't with our businesses, we have to talk to them directly," McCrory said. "Our goal is to better understand how to meet their workforce needs and how to more effectively connect North Carolinians to great careers.

"I appreciate all of our agencies and industry working together to make this a success," McCrory said. "NCWorks covers all 100 counties, so we need to listen in all 100 counties. This initiative is critical, so we better understand what we need to do differently."

NCWorks focuses on a new partnership that includes the N.C. Department of Commerce, the N.C. Community College System, the N.C. Department of Public Instruction and the NCWorks Commission to improve the state's workforce system.

Through the NCWorks initiative, partners will create a stronger alignment of services and resources to meet the workforce needs of businesses, connect North Carolinians to technical training and quality careers, and use data to monitor and assess program outcomes. # Peterson enjoys new career as Nurse Aide Steffie Peterson says it was a friend who inspired her to return to school to become a nurse aide but it is her 14-year-

old son who continues to motivate her.

Peterson, 34, dropped out of high school when she was in the ninth grade and tried to make a living doing home care

for people. After struggling with low wage work, she decided to return to school to make a better life for herself and her son.

She chose Beaufort County Community College and enrolled in the Basic Skills Program, eventually earning her high school equivalency degree.

Peterson admitted it wasn't easy to go back to school, but she credits the Basic Skills teachers and staff in helping her succeed.

"I thank God for all of them," she said. "They said 'Believe in yourself! You can do it'."

While working towards her high school equivalency, Peterson enrolled in BCCC's Nurse Aide I course with the help of a local non-profit, the

Society of St. Vincent de Paul, and was one of the participants in BCCC's first Basic Skills Plus class.

"I like helping people," Peterson said when asked why she chose a medical career.

Again, she said it wasn't easy to complete her studies.

"At first I was nervous," she said. "But my teachers really helped a lot, and my classmates really helped a lot."

After receiving her Nurse Aide I certification, Peterson decided to continue her studies, earning a Nurse Aide II certification in August with four other class members.

Peterson is employed with Coastal Home Care Agency and plans to continue her medical studies with the goal of working in a hospital or doctor's office.

# See the stage production of Phantom of the Opera


Join the Beaufort County Community College Foundation, Saturday, Oct. 18, for a trip to Durham to see the stage production of *The Phantom of the Opera*, Broadway's longest-running musical.

The trip will also include time for a visit to the renowned Paul Green Theater in Chapel Hill with a lecture by Professor Jeff Phipps.

The cost of the trip, open to all BCCC students, faculty, staff, alumni and friends of the college, is \$200 per person. The registration deadline is Friday, Oct. 10.

The price of the trip includes transportation to and from Durham, lunch and tickets for seats in the orchestra section for *The Phantom of the Opera* at the Durham Performing Arts Center in downtown Durham.

The trip will leave the Building 8 parking lot at BCCC by 7:30 a.m. and travel to Chapel Hill for a tour of the Paul Green Theater. Located in the Center for Dramatic Art on



the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill campus, the Paul Green Theatre is a 500 seat facility that was completed in 1976. The theater is home to PlayMakers' six annual Mainstage productions as well as professional actors, directors and artists from across the country. It is named for the American playwrite, known for his depictions of North Carolina during the early 20th Century. He is best remembered for his outdoor dramas, including The Lost Colony, written in 1937.

The group will travel from the theater to lunch at Kitchen in Chapel Hill. Recently voted the best French restaurant in that town, Kitchen serves traditional French bistro fare made from local ingredients in an informal environment. Travelers will have a three-course lunch that includes appetizer, entrée and dessert.

After lunch, the group will travel to DPAC for a matinee performance of *The Phantom of the Opera*, which opened on Broadway in 1988 and has been performed there more than 11,000 times. Based on the French novel by Gaston Leroux, the musical's central plot revolves around a beautiful soprano, Christine Daaé, who becomes the obsession of a mysterious, disfigured musical genius. The beloved story and thrilling score – featuring songs such as "Music of the Night" and "All I Ask of You" - will be performed by a cast of 52, making this production one of the largest now on tour.

After the performance, participants will depart Durham for the trip home and enjoy light refreshments on the bus. ## **BCECHS** history teacher receives state award

Amanda Smith, a teacher at Beaufort County Early College High School, has been named North Carolina History Teacher of the Year for 2014.

Smith teaches World History and Civics and Economics to ninth grade students at the high school, housed on the Beaufort County Community College campus.

The award was presented to Smith at the Tuesday, Sept. 22, meeting of the Beaufort County Board of Education by Fay Gore, Section Chief of the K-12 Social Studies Division of the N.C. Department of Public Instruction.

It is sponsored by The Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History, The History Channel and Preserve America.

"A panel of teachers, administrators and academics from your state chose you for your use of primary documents in the classroom, the level of inspiration that you provide to your students and your career achievements in education," said Lesley S. Herrmann, executive director of the Lehrman Institute in citing Smith for the award. "We thank you for engaging students with dedication and creativity."

As the 2014 N.C. History Teacher of the Year, Smith will receive

## **Beaufort Early College High is tops on ACT**

Students in Beaufort County Early College High School scored higher on the ACT than other early college high schools in eastern North Carolina, according to a recent report from the N.C. Department of Public Instruction.

Beaufort County Early College High School, or BCECHS, students take high school and tuition-free community college courses and graduate in five years with a high school diploma and an associate's degree in the field of their choice. They can then either head into the work force with job-related skills or transfer to a four-year college.

The school is housed on the BCCC campus with classrooms and offices in the lower level of Building 5 and a portion of Building 10.

The students at BCECHS, now in its seventh year, face a rigorous schedule of classes – equivalent to honors courses in a traditional high school – which prepare them to begin taking community college courses their second year in the school.

The ACT, or American College Testing, is a national college admissions exam. All juniors in North Carolina are required to take it.

More than 26 percent of students at BCECHS met all benchmarks on the ACT, well above other early colleges in eastern North Carolina.

"I was a little nervous because I know there is a lot running on my score," BCECHS student Sarah Clingenpeel told WNCT television in a recent interview.

Clingenpeel is a 12th grade student at the high school. She'll graduate in June 2016 with two years of college under her belt. The tests she took in March mean a lot for her future.

"It really does judge how well you're going to do and what colleges you're going to go to," said Clingenpeel.

"I feel like I was prepared really well, especially since at the time we took it, we had taken more high school courses than the typical high school student would have taken, so I think we were more prepared than typical high school students," 12th grade student Caitlyn Andrews told WNCT.

Other early college students in eastern North Carolina did not score as high. Looking at juniors who met all four benchmarks of English, math, reading and science, plus writing, 26.8 percent of Beaufort County Early College juniors met those marks.

BCECHS Principal Emily Pake said BCECHS teachers work to prepare their students for challenging college work which also helps prepare them for the ACT.

Selection for these programs is based on academic performance. Applicants compete for admission based on quality points and GPA earned by completing the general education courses required for their program of interest. Applicants who do not rank into the program will be alternates and notified according to the ranked order should space become available.

**Enforcement Training Program.** 

Other college divisions and programs – including the Division of Arts and Sciences, the Division of Continuing Education, and business and computer programs- are planning displays and hands-on opportunities to highlight their offerings, Sullivan said.

Student groups will also have displays that highlight activities available on campus.

School.

She earned a bachelor's degree in history with a teaching license from Meredith College in 2002 and a master's degree in public history from N.C. State University with a concentration in museum education techniques in 2010.

Smith has worked as a teacher for seven years, serving at Beaufort County Early College High School for three years.

She is a member to the N.C. Governor's Teachers Network and, in that role, is working to develop lesson plans for social studies teachers that will be released in May. Her area of expertise in that project is non-violence, civil rights and human rights.

At BCECHS, Smith is co-advisor of the Interact Club, a service club affiliated with the Washington Noon Rotary Club. Students in the club volunteer at the local animal shelter and conduct fund-raising activities for Eagle's Wings, Ruth's House and the American Heart Association.

Smith and her students are also active in National History Day competitions. As the state's top history day teacher, she developed a how-to guide on project and exhibit development which will be available nationwide next year for teachers participating in the National History Day competition.

She is the author of a book published in 2014 about the Civil Rights movement in Williamston, titled "The Williamston Freedom Movement: A North Carolina Town's Struggle for Civil Rights 1957-70."

Smith is a volunteer with the Historic Bath State Historic Site where she leads guided tours and conducts educational programs.

"We actually incorporate the strategies in the classroom every day," Pake told WNCT "The teachers know what the college readiness skills look like. They meet with college instructors to align a curriculum that will help the students perform well." Pake says students are being prepared as soon as they walk in the door.

"They make sure that the students write every day in class, they read non-fiction material, to make sure they can in-

crease their vocabulary and be able to pick out main concepts," said Pake.

"I'm proud of our school but I think we always have room to improve so I think we should just keep striving to do better every year," said Andrews.

Beaufort County Schools superintendent Dr. Don Phipps says the district will look at how students are being prepared at the early college and implement similar approaches at other high schools. He says data like this is often used to help high schools that may struggle in an area that other schools exceed in.

Early college students in Beaufort County who took the test in March say their teachers had a lot to do with their success.

"Even though I was nervous when I saw the test, I realized it wasn't as bad as I thought it was going to be because all the teachers really helped me in getting ready for it," said Clingenpeel.

Compared to last year, ACT scores meeting all four benchmarks plus writing at Beaufort County's early college are five times higher...
